Introduction

We Gather

We gather together all who have travelled from near and far, in person and virtually, all present in spirit as the family of faith. The Priest begins by saying:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Grace and Peace be with you

And keep you in the love of Christ.

Penitential Act

We begin our journey to encounter with the Penitential Act, seeking for a change of heart as we reflect on our Christian journey so far. We call to mind our failures, always remembering God is journeying alongside us in loving forgiveness.

God of our journeying, inviting us to travel with you, forgive us when we cling to outworn security, afraid to let go of what is safe and familiar. Give us courage to take the risk of answering your call into joyous adventure.

Come to me all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.

Lord, have mercy.
Christ, have mercy.

The Priest asks God to forgive us:
Almighty God,
who forgives all who truly repent,
have mercy upon you and set you free from sin,
strengthen you in goodness
and keep you in eternal life;
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us pray.

We all pray in silence with the Priest for a moment. Then the Priest says either the collect for the day or the prayer for pilgrims.

O Pilgrim God, come with us on our journey come with your saints and prophets and angels come with your bread and wine and stories come be our light, our hope, our healing, come lead us safely home. **Amen.**

We Listen

The Liturgy of the Word

We sit for the readings. During the readings it helps to listen for a sentence or a phrase that really speaks to us about God. Focus particularly on that.

First Reading

At the end of the reading:
This is the word of the Lord
Thanks be to God

The Gospel

We stand to greet the Gospel

Listen to the Gospel of Christ according to Saint N. Glory to you, O Lord.

After the Gospel:
This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

The Intercessions

We are invited to sit and pray quietly for a moment as we hold all those who have asked us to pray for them in our hearts and bring them before God.

We stand and pray together Lord, You have always given bread for the coming day; and though we are poor, today we believe.

Lord, You have always given strength for the coming day; and though we are weak, today we believe.

Lord, You have always given peace for the coming day; and though of anxious heart, today we believe.

Lord, You have always kept me safe in trials; and now, tried as we are, today we believe.

Lord, You have always marked the road for the coming day; and though it may be hidden, today we believe.

Lord, You have always lightened this darkness of ours; and though the night is here, today we believe.

Lord, You have always spoken when time was ripe; and though you be silent now, today we believe. We stand for the peace

Jesus says, 'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you.' Do not let your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid.

The peace of the Lord be with you always.

And also with you.

Then the Priest prepares the gifts of bread and wine at the Altar. The Priest then prays over the gifts:

As we bring this bread to you Lord of the Elements, we offer up to you our hearts, our energies our labor, our leisure our relationships, our minds our thoughts, time and talents, all that we create, all that we possess, our souls, our coming, our going, our strength, our days and nights, our hopes and fears, the day of our birth and the moment of our death, Oh bread and breath of life.

Blessed be God for ever.

We pour out this wine and offer to you the woes of life poured out. Disappointment, disease, hurt, or handicap.

As grapes crushed to make this wine so we offer to you all who are crushed by hunger, homelessness, violence or abuse.
You who put beam in sun and moon, take all this and transform it into the deep rich wine of everlasting life.

Blessed be God for ever.

The Priest may then pray an additional prayer over the gifts.

The Eucharistic Prayer

This is the most important prayer in our service.

The Eucharistic Prayer contains words of praise and thanks for the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Priest chooses one of the seven Eucharistic prayers and then begins:

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The Lords Prayer

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The preface is the prayer that precedes the consecration of the gifts focusing our minds on what is about to happen. It changes with the seasons and for special occasions such as Saints' days.

At the end of the Preface we say or sing:

Holy, holy, holy Lord,

God of power and might,

heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest.

We then sit or kneel for the Consecration of the gifts. The Priest then continues with the Eucharistic prayer.

After the words of institution the priest holds up for the people, first the consecrated bread then the consecrated wine.

The Priest then says:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come in glory.

The priest then continues with the Eucharistic prayer.

Near the end of the Eucharistic Prayer the Priest will take the chalice and the paten with the host and raising both and says:

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Through him, with him, in him,

in the unity of the Holy Spirit

all honour and glory are yours, almighty Father,

for ever and ever.

Amen.

As our Saviour taught us, we boldly pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom,

The Communion

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ **Though we are many, we are one body for we all share in one bread.**

The Priest then takes the chalice and paten and holding them up invites us to take communion with these or other suitable words:

Come, let us receive the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, given for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Come, receive who you are, become what your see.

Those in Church come forward to receive communion
Pew by pew as directed by the Verger
Please remember to sanitise your hands
And return to your seat via the one way system



Those participating via the live stream are invited to join with a prayer of Spiritual Communion

And the Blessing of God Almighty, The Father, Son and Holy Spirit, Be upon you and remain with you now and always. **Amen**.
