#### Plans for the Future

The sun has been shining and gardens are starting to bloom and I think we can say that summer is definitely arriving. Along with our gardens, the church to is coming to life as we head towards July and August things are beginning to get busy. With Pilgrimage as one of our main priorities to develop these summer months are important as it is the main pilgrim season. Along with making sure our churches are open on Sundays we will be looking to hold various events over the summer, from fundraisers and social events to pilgrim services and journeys. Much of this summer will be about trying things out so that next year we can have a properly planned diary of summer events for pilgrims and seekers, locals and visitors. So keep an eye on the weekly news sheet and Facebook for things that are coming up.

We've already got a summer time-table of family events planned with Wild Church beginning in Llangynhafal & Llanbedr DC, Taste & See & The Bridge in town and we continue to develop the successful Forest Church in Clocaenog.

We've also got plenty going on in our buildings, planning for the future and re-building after the pandemic. Llangynhafal church is almost finished and we'll be planning events there to invite everyone to come and see the new facilities. In Llanynys there are exciting plans for a pilgrimage and retreat centre and along with Debbie Sawyer developing the Ceriglwydion we're nearly ready for a faculty application for developing the interior of the church as well as developing a car park and community garden. In Clocaenog we're also getting ready to apply for Faculty permission to develop the interior of the church and outside we'll be looking to build on the success of Forest Church to create a worship space that connects us to the divine through nature. In Llanbedr plans are being drawn up to look at the interior of the church to bring an open and dynamic space to allow groups for study and fellowship and more.

Our team as well is growing with Revd. John Searl joining us over the summer as a non-stipendiary priest (NSM) and Natasha Quinn-Thomas being ordained as deacon on the 3rd of July and joining us for her 2 year curacy. An exciting new opportunity has also come up with Tim Asbridge joining us as Director of Music for Mission. Tim will have a dual role focussing on re-invigorating the adult choir in the Ruthin churches and to develop a Mission Area Song School. The Song School will be offering a starter in music and singing to primary school aged children across the Dyffryn Clwyd with a view to develop children's choirs which will rotate around our churches on Sundays in term time adding and enhancing our weekly worship. This is an exciting new venture and I think the only project of its kind in the area.

With so much going on its hard not to feel the joy of our faith permeating our lives after a year and more of forced stillness, it seems like that time of isolation is coming to an end and the prayers said so fervently are leading to the spirit moving in so many places. But best of all of these things is quietly, Sunday by Sunday the worship in all our churches feeding and sustaining us in what feels like a new age of evangelism. The heart of all we do is always to be found in the community of the church in prayer, being fed by Sacrament and Word and I thank each of you for being a part of this all, whether you're volunteering and driving forward some of these plans or quietly in the background praying for the future of our churches, we all have our part to play. If you can spare a few minutes every day to pray the prayer for Church Renewal it will help carry all our plans and more as we seek to deepen our relationship with God and bring others to the joy of faith.

### **News from Llanychan**



event on 10<sup>th</sup> July, "Hymns and Pimm's", we have been prevented from singing in church for so long now and I am sure the Pimm's will help things along.



## Heritage and legacy...



This is definitely the year of 'staycations.' I was reminded of a delightful pilgrimage, some years ago now, to Iona...

Lying off the west coast of the Isle of Mull the tiny Isle of Iona, barely three miles long by one mile wide, has had an influence out of all proportion to its size to the establishment of Christianity in Scotland, England, Wales and throughout mainland Europe.

In 563 AD St. Columba arrived on its white sandy beaches with 12 followers, built his first Celtic church and established a monastic community.

So who was St. Columba? He was the grandson of the Irish King Niall. He left Ireland for Scotland not as missionary but as an act of self-imposed penance for a bloody mess he had caused at home. He had upset the king of Ireland by refusing to hand over a copy of the Gospels he had illegally copied, this led to a pitched battle in which Columba's warrior family prevailed. Full of remorse for his actions and the deaths he had

ultimately caused he fled, finally setting on Iona as the first place he found from where he lcouldn't see his native Ireland.

However, he was not the shy retiring type and set about building lona's original abbey from clay and wood. In this endeavour he displayed some strange idiosyncrasies, including banishing women and cows from the island, claiming that "where there is a cow there is a woman, and where there is a woman there is mischief". [And you thought I had strange ideas!] The abbey builders had to leave their wives, daughters, etc., on the nearby Eilean nam Ban (Woman's Island). Stranger still, he also banished frogs and snakes from Iona. How he accomplished this feat is not as well documented! Over the centuries the monks of Iona produced countless elaborate carvings, manuscripts and Celtic crosses. Perhaps their greatest legacy was the exquisite Book of Kells, which dates from 800 AD, and is currently on display in Trinity College, Dublin. Shortly after this in 806 came the first of the Viking raids when many of the monks were slaughtered and their work destroyed. The Celtic Church lacking central control and organisation diminished in size and stature over the years to be replaced by the much larger and stronger Roman Church. Even Iona was not exempt from these changes and in 1203 a nunnery for



the Order of the Black Nuns was established and the present-day Benedictine Abbey was built. The Abbey was a victim of the Reformation and lay in ruins until 1899 when its restoration started.

In 1938 George MacLeod founded the Iona Community, an ecumenical Christian

community of men and women from different walks of life and different traditions in the Christian church committed to seeking new ways of living the Gospel of Jesus in today's world. This community is a leading force in the present Celtic Christianity revival.

The Iona Community runs 3 residential centres on the Isle of Iona and on Mull which are places of welcome and engagement giving a unique opportunity to live together in community with people of every background from all over the world. Members share a common Rule which includes:

- Daily prayer and reading the Bible
- Mutual sharing and accountability for their use of time and money
- Regular meeting together
- Action and reflection for justice, peace and the integrity of creation Members meet regularly throughout the year in local groups and in 4 plenary gatherings, including a week on lona.

For me, it was a joy to live in community with others and contemplate, once again, the rich heritage of Christian faith we are all called to pass on to future generations.

'Lord, teach us when we are inclined to forget, that places of retreat are not places of escape; that when we clasp hands in prayer we take responsibility with you for your world; that worship and politics are not separate in your economy, nor should they be in ours. Because it was your Son who taught us to pray for your Kingdom to come in the here and now, in this place and time: for your will to be done on earth as in heaven. We dare to pray in his name, amen, let it be so.'

As we prayerfully seek to enact Christ's call upon our lives and the life of our church communities and formulate our M.A.P – our Mission Action Plan, I wonder what legacy Christ is calling us to pass on here as a gift to future generations from Dyffryn Clwyd Mission Area...
